ALASKA PORT TIPS

What to bring:

- If you are entering Canada:
 Canadian law requires that all persons entering Canada carry both proof of citizenship and proof of identity. A valid U.S. passport, passport card, or NEXUS card satisfies these requirements for U.S. citizens. Children under 16 need only present proof of U.S. citizenship.
- Suggest bringing layered clothing, since temperatures can change considerably during the day and/or in different environments such as near glaciers, in rainforests, in town, etc.
- Sunglasses and comfortable walking shoes
- Medications

- Remind your clients to bring binoculars on the cruise and to take them on any Shore Excursion off the ship. It will enable them to see distant wildlife.
- Finally, advise them to be sure to bring a camera (one that they can carry with them easily), as well as charger cords and memory cards or sticks. They'll find more photo opportunities in Alaska than in almost any other place in the world.

Temps:

June-August, daytime highs range from 60-80 degrees Fahrenheit(15-26 degrees Celsius), with night times dipping to 40-50 degrees (4-10 degrees Celsius).

May and September are typically 5-10 degrees cooler. Keep in mind that temperatures will vary wildly depending on what region you plan to visit.
